PARKS DEPARTMENT.

ANNUAL REPORT for -- 1 9 2 0 --

His Worship the Mayor, Commissioners and Council.

Gentlemen .

I beg to submit my 8th Annual Report dealing with the work of the Parks Department for 1923, with recommendations for 1921 for your consideration.

The horticultural activities of the Department have again suffered from an excessively dry season, the rainfall being only 13.43 inches, but the gradual improvements that are annually being made to the irrigation and sprinkling systems is rendering the Department less dependent on rainfall each year.

The dry open weather experienced so far this winter does not promise well for the satisfactory wintering of trees and shrubs.

The gross revenue of the Department was \$26,739.18 inclusive

The gross revenue of the Department was \$26,739.18 inclusive of Interdepartmental credits amounting to \$2731.84. An itemized statement of these earnings is given at the end of this Report.

Summary of planting for the year is as follows:-Trees, 3526. Shrubs, 2453. Vines, 625 Perennials, 25211. Annuals 73196. Blubs 24.

This is exclusive of operations in connection with gegetable

growing and propagation work in Nursery and Greenhouses.

Regular maintenance work was carried on in all parks so far as appropriations permitted. The upkeep of the park system requires constant vigilance and care, to prevent as far as possible or repair, the damage done by ignorant and mischievous elements visiting the parks, to trees, flowers, buildings and furniture. It is useless, under present financial conditions, to recommend very much in the way of improvements. It is to be hoped,

It is useless, under present financial conditions, to recommend very much in the way of improvements. It is to be hoped, however, that a sufficient appropriation will be made to reasonably maintain what we have. The public demand for service of all kinds will always be far ahead of the means at the disposal of a Department, and this is very apt to predispose a superintendent to make suggestions and recommendations for improvements on a larger scale than the community can really afford. To do this, however, serves no good purpose, but tends to embarrass the administration, and I feel that the Head of a Department should make recommendations in such a manner that the Commissioners can depend on his judgment with regard to these recommendations to the same extent as they should be able to depend on his ability to carry them out. No harm can be done, however, by a judicious handling of publicity in connection with the Parks Department work with particular stress on the need for certain improvements, for this may result in interesting wealthy and patriotic citizens to such an extent that they might from time to time furnish funds

to inaugurate new features, thus benefiting the people as a whole and making a lasting memorial for themselves.

Due to the fact that much land is coming into the possession of the City, it is possible that no more favourable time could be chosen than the present for the preparation of plans showing future developments of a comprehensive system of parks, park-ways, and playgrounds, the foundation to be laid now and the development work carried on systematically year by year, as available funds will permit. In considering this subject, it should be dealt with in its entirety, because the total value of parks, playgrounds and boulevards in the City is largely influenced by their dependence on one another and their satisfactory distribution throughout the City. Therefore, a plan of development that will meet future needs should be formulated, and the actual construction provided for in a leisurely but comprehensive manner.

The importance of this Gity with reference to its prosperous *agricultural surroundings. also its importance as a railway and? distributing centre will eventually make it a great commercial and financial metropolis. It is most important that the agencies for moral and social progress be developed as commercial development takes place. If we would draw people from the outside, we must not only be able to show visitors the business facilities and advantages, but we must also be in a position to show them a beautiful City, with parks, playgrounds and boulevards, that will provide for the comfort, health and happiness of the people. All civilized communities have now come to realize that playgrounds must be provided for the children, and recreation grounds and parks for the large working body of the citizens.

CENTRAL PARK.

1900 feet of wooden curbing has been placed at the lawn edges, thereby keeping them neat and reducing the cost of trimming. Sea ts and other park furniture have been painted, 103 loads of cinders used on paths, 540 feet of 2" service pipe have been added to the sprinkler system and the system extended by 1400 feet.

The Public Library was supplied with eight window boxes and a floral display maintained in the building, the Park supplying the flowers during the summer, and the Greenhouses during the

The reconstruction of the arbors was completed, fifteen loads of refuse removed. 35 loads of manure were used in fertilizing and mulching.

A bicycle stand was made for the front of the Library. The rope on the Flagpole was stolen and had to be replaced. Three spot lights were placed on the bandstand to light the park, but they were not altogether satisfactory, as the light was not sufficiently diffused.

The perennial flower borders were extended across the east end immediately west of the Library. The ceiling at the back of the rostrum of the bandstand was replastered and tinted. Lawns were renovated where trails had been made during the winter months. An effort is being made to prevent further damage by closing the park for the winter.

Eight band concerts were held and were attended by large and

appreciative crowds.

The lawns were sprayed six times for the purpose of destroying dendelions. The bonefit of these sprayings will be apparent next season.

CENTRAL PARK. (CONTED)

Twenty-four vines, 134 shrubs, 560 perennials. 19770 annuals and 24 bulbs were planted.

A number of large wreaths were proveded and other assistance given in connection with the Memorial Day Service.

MEWATA PARK. Park furniture was painted and repaired. The bandstand which had become very dilapidated, and was

in a dangerous condition, was remodelled and reconstructed.

A building 16' x 24' was moved to the park to be used as a

dressing room.

Sixty shrubs, and six small trees were transferred from Central Park.

RILEY PARK. Ninety-five loads of manure were used for fertilizing and mulching, and 31 loads of refuse removed.

The incompleted driveway on the south side of the park was graded

and extended along the bank south of the pool.

Park furniture and buildings were painted. The rope from the flagpole having been stolen was replaced. Certain bad spots on the lawns were renovated.

Sixty trees, thirty shrubs, 4287 perennials, and 115200 annuals The floral display in this Park was very effective were planted. during the past season. Growth having become crowded in certain places 21 trees and 488 shrubs were transplanted to the boulevards adjoining the Park. Fifty loads of cinders were used in road construction and maintenance.

The pool was again a most popular feature, and attracted large numbers of children, there being as many as 60 in the pool at one time on one occasion. The mud bottom, however, is a great nuisance.

ST. GEORGE'S ISLAND. An added attraction to the Island Park was a large addition to the Refreshment Booth constructed by the concessionaire, mainly for the purpose of a Dance Hall, and incidentally as a shelter for picnic parties. The dances held in this building were a very popular feature and drew large concourses of people every fine evening during the summer. The old dance floor, which was decayed to such an extent as to be practically useless, was removed and the space converted into a spacious auto park. This was greatly needed, as the parking of cars in such large and ever increasing numbers had become a very serious problem.

Some turtles were very kindly donated to the Department by

Mr. A.E. Volk of 62 New Street. A pool and enclosure were made for

these adjoining the Deer Pen.

Two new flower beds were made. As at Central Park and Riley Park the flagpole rope was stolen from this Park, and had to be replaced at a cost of \$16.32. 175 shrubs, 850 perennials and 1200 annuals were

planted.

By permission of the Commissioners a charge of 25¢ per load was made for all gravel removed from the shores of the Island, except that used by City Departments. The revenue collected in this way amounted The revenue collected in this way amounted to \$276.50, and helped to some extent to pay for the damage done to roads and bridges, but, as the bulk of what is taken out is used for the City Departments, only a comparatively small percentage of that removed was paid for. I think the Departments using gravel should give some assistance in repairing damage to roads.

Eight band concerts were held during the season, and the concessionaire had an orchestra in attendance every evening and Sunday

strongest attractions to a municipal park, for the greatest crowds always assembled on those occasions when it was known that there was to be a band concert.

1056 picnic parties made use of the Island. 160 loads of cinders were used for road maintenance and improvement. 231 loads of manure used for mulching and fertilizing, and seven loads of refuse were removed.

With regard to the design of buildings to be erected in any park by a concessionaire it is very necessary that the greatest care should be exercised, or there is risk of having something that is thoroughly in-appropriate and in very bad taste.

The Comfort Stations in this Park are altogether inadequate, and have to be closed when the water is high in the Bow River. I therefore beg to recommend that an appropriation be made for the construction of new Comfort Stations.

VICTORIA PARK.

Some large trees were removed at the request of the Exhibition Company to make room for the Professional Baseball Ground.

SHAGGANAPPI PARK GOLF COURSE.

The Clubhouse was opened on 24th April and closed on 6th November. During this period 14,841 persons played over the course. This is not, by any means, a complete record of games played, as many people continue to use the Course in favourable weather throughout the winter. This has been particularly noticeable this winter. Clubhouse open 197 days. Greatest number of players in one day 154, on 20th June. Daily average. 75.5

Two new tees were made and all tees resurfaced with clay and cinders. Stands were made for sandboxes much to the satisfaction of the players.

Thirty-four loads of soil were removed from bunkers, 20 loads of refuse were removed, eight loads of rock removed and 62 loads of loam used on greens. All greens were loamed three times. Four new greens were made. No. 6 fairway was lengthened 80 yards, No. 14, 50 yards, and No. 15, 20 yards. One grass green was seeded but the grass was badly damaged by grasshoppers. All fairways were moved three times with ordinary hay mower. There were at times complaints regarding the length of the grass on fairways. The Department has not the proper equipment to keep these in condition. T therefore recommend that a triple horsemower be purchased for use during the coming season.

The Course was fenced on east and part of the south side. It is most unfortunate that the negotiations to secure a strip of land on the west side of the Course were not successful, as the opening of a thoroughfare there which would make it possible to completely fence in the course and would obviate much damage and expense.

The introduction of a rule requiring all players to present a ticket (previously obtained at the Clubhouse) at the first tee, before commencing to play has tended to better regulate the course, and has undoubtedly resulted in additional revenue.

SHAGGANAPPI PARK GOLF COURSE. (CONTD).

Though some members, as they become experts in the game, leave and join the other clubs, there is still a steady increase in patronage. I would much regret to see any considerable increase in fees, for golf is too healthful and popular an amusement to be confined to those only who can afford membership in a Country Club.

J TUDEDO PARK.

The east half of this Park was rented as has been done for several years. As no special provision had been made for the planting of trees and shrubs in Crescent Heights for which there was very urgent demand from residents in that locality, this work was charged to Tuxedo Park.
I beg to recommend that the west end of this Park be fenced.

Tompkins Gardens.

The filling of the excavation at the west end ed, fourteen loads of loam being used and the space Fifty-five shrubs and 3,610 flowering plants were was completed, seeded. This plot, situated as it is in the centre of traffic, planted. requires constant attention to keep it clean and free from litter.

R.N.W.M.POLICE MEMORIAL. This Plot was maintained and 1220 perennials were planted.

GARDEN CRESCENT.

2060 perennials were planted.

CITY HALL GARDENS. Twenty-five shrubs were planted on either side of the main entrance and 2006 flowering plants used for the floral display.

New apparatus was furnished the Sunskine Creck on 7th Ave.. Playground apparatus was repaired and additional equipment provided at the Childrens' Shelter.

August at Crescent Heights School, Ramsay School, Riverside School, Victoria School, Mewata Park, Riley Park and St. George's Island. This supervision was more successful than in any previous year, mainly due to the excellent assistance rendered voluntarily by Mr. Ellis of the Y.M.C.A., and Miss O'Neil of the Y.W.C.A., who were untiring in their efforts to made the play-grounds popular and the work of supervision a success. Mr. Ellis, in particular undertook this task at considerable personal sacrifice, and it is difficult for me to find words to express the deep sense of appreciation and gratitude I personally feel for the assistance given in this department of our activities. The thanks of the Department are also due to the Managers of the Y.M.C.A., and the Y.W.C.A., for so kindly allowing the use of the pools at their respective buildings by the children attending the playgrounds, a concession that was taken advantage of to the greatest possible extent and was very much appreciated. The children themselves, who, after all, are the parties most concerned, were most emphatic in their expressions of appreciation of the various schemes adopted for their entertainment and amusement.

On July 5th the Supervision season was opened and was continued until August 28th, there being seven centres with 14 play leaders, two on each ground. Seven of these trained supervisors were employed from June 28th to July 10th at Victoria Park, where a playground was provided consisting of swings, teeters and sand piles, while Victoria Hall was used as a rest and play room. The following new games were introduced and created a good deal of interest and excitement. Tip cat, Schlay ball, Tether Tennis, Rubber Quoits, Action games, Singing Games, and Storytelling. The industrial work consisted of Plasticine, Sewing cards, Reed and Raffia work, Peg boards and Wool weaving.

Junior, Intermediate and Senior Leagues were organized for the athletic activities and contests were arranged between the several playgrounds, culminating first in a festival on each ground at which parents were invited to attend to watch the play and inspect the work of the children, and finally, at the close of the season, in a monster Athletic Meet in which all playgrounds took part,

Requests for the flooding of rinks are becoming so numerous that, to comply with them all, the appropriation for this purpose would have to be considerably increased. I therefore beg to recommend that one good rink be established in a park on on city property in each district, free of charge, and for any other rinks applied for, a charge of \$5.00 per 25 ft lot, or its equivalent, be made for each flooding over and above the charge made by the waterworks department for water, payment to be made in advance. To simplify matters for those making application, I would further recommend that fees for both water and flooding be collected by the Parks Department, the fees for water to be be collected by the Parks Department, the fees for water to be afterwards transferred to the Waterworks Department.

The total area of rinks constructed is approximately 16 acres.

Fences were repaired at Hillhurst Athletic Park, dressing rooms considerably improved, gas and additional light installed, comfort stations and showers with hot and cold water provided. The football ground was considerably improved and gave great satisfaction to the players.

The baseball diamonds at Mewata Park were in active use every night throughout the season, and, though the numbers of spectators were not so large as during the previous season, there were fair crowds in attendance most evenings. This falling of for spectators is, however, in no way to be regretted, as the athletic facilities in the parks are, or should be, primarily intended for the good of active participants in the games rather than for the benefit of mere spectators.

Football, (Association). The season opened at Hillhurst on May 17th
The Seniors played 22, the 2nd division 23,
and the Intermediates 24 games. The attendance at the Senior games was 16,192. Benefit and other games brought the total on this field to 89. No record of the games played at Mewata was kept.

New Goal posts were made for the Stanley Jones School

athletic ground.

Rugby. Eight matches were played at Hillhurst for which admission was charged.

The three cricket pitches in Riley Park were in very active use all the season. 78 regular matches being played, besides practice games four nights a week throughout the season. Some improvement was made to these, also to the Pevilion and further pavilion accommodation was provided. The use of the steam roller on the pitches put them in excellent shape. Assistance was given in improving and maintaining the Military Cricket Ground in Upper Hillhurst and St. John's Club Ground at Western Canada College.

At Hillhurst 30 senior and 88 junior league games were played last winter, and these with practice games kept the rink in use constantly. This season additional hookey rinks have been made here and at Mewata, but the resources of the Department

will be taxed to their full limit. for the lady hockey players are playing six days a week, the Tuxis three days a week. There are over 100 games to be played by the Public and High School Leagues, and there are various other organizations that have teams. Tennis.

Temporary Tennis courts were provided in St. George's Ishand and Riley Parks.

A field day was held at Hillhurst by the Boy Scouts, and their officers pronounced the grounds ideal for the purpose.

Under this heading work was also done for the Professional Baseball Association, Boxing Commission, Military Athletic Assn., and for the Army & Navy Veterans' Sports, for the Skiing Club, the Curling Clubs during the Bonspiel, and in Victoria Park for the Public and High School Sports. Some grading and fencing was done on School property in Crescent Heights with the idea of developing an athletic field.

I would recommend that Block 40, Killarney, which is noe City property, be fenced, graded and developed as a recreation ground.

As indicated above 228 trees were planted on streets in Crescent Heights and 130 shrubs were planted at one of the street intersections in that district, as the result of very earnest requests from residents in that neighbourhood. This is the first planting done on the North Hill.

The grass on boulevards was cut only twice during the season.

this work being started on June 11th.

As a rule planting operations are completed before there is much growth of grass. This year, however, owing to a very late spring, everything seemed to require to be done at once, and the grass had grown sufficiently to require cutting when tree planting was started. As a consequence, the grass had grown to such an extent by the time planting was completed that it had to be out with scythes, and shears before the mowers could be used.

Owing to the open weather experienced this winter better progreas had been made with tree pruning and dressing than ever before, and this work is now almost completed, the trimmings having been

saved, as heretofore, for purposes of propagation.

Tree staking and tying has required and has received considerable attention throughout the year.

Ninety-five loads of refuse were removed.

Some attention was given to cultivating the spaces around the trees, but not nearly as much as the importance of this work warrants.

The trees on the Bow River Boulevard between Centre Street and Langevin Bridges were overhauled, all dead trees and limbs being removed and wounds dressed. Every effort should be made to preserve these old trees as they are an ornamental feature that

could not quickly be replaced.

Very considerable damage is constantly being done to the boulevards in all parts of the City by the opening up of pits to gain access to gas, water and other conduits. I would very strongly recommend that it be made compulsory for all persons opening a boulevard to first obtain a permit from the Parks Department and that this Department be permitted to make such charge for these permits as is considered sufficient to pay for I consider the present arrangement repairing the damage done.

most unfair to the Department.
A subject that can be well considered under this heading is that of improvements to the river frontages and also the bluffs surrounding the City. This land is gradually becoming the property of the Municipality, and I would earnestly recommend that

an appropriation (not necessarily a large one) be made annually for the improvement of those portions that are city property. The afforestation of these slopes would add much to the beauty of the City, would create excellent picnic and play grounds within easy access of all, would mitigate the dust nuisance, afford a certain amount of shelter, provide splendid protectorates for birds (a feature the importance of which, to both agricultural and horticulture, is not generally understood), and would thus, in the course of years, become valuable assets to the City. If a City plan had been prepared 25 years ago reserving for public use these bluffs together with rivor frontage and ravines not adapted for satisfactory home sites, the foundation for a magnificent park system would have been laid. Having failed to do it then, the present opportunity should be taken the fullest advantage of.

CEMETERY.

Further considerable grading had to be done and roads built to make areas available and accessible for burial purposes. 516 loads of manure were used in mulching and fertilizing.

The removal of the old dilapidated buildings were completed and a new comfort station, and tool shed erected.

A new fence was built along the west and south sides and a belt of trees and shrubs planted inside this. Yes trees and 929 shrubs were planted and 6558 perennials and 10,272 annuals were used in the borders.

Further extensions were made to the water service.

An old well that had been a source of danger for some time was securely covered.

Permits for the erection of monuments are issued free of charge at the present time. I beg to recommend that a charge of \$1.00 be made for these permits, to meet the cost of searching the ll. records to secure the information required, and also to repair the

damage to the lawn surfaces which is inevitable no matter how care-

fully headstones may be set.

Before another year has passed interments will, in all probability, have been made in the new Cemetery, the site of which has yet to be selected. I would recommend that before this takes place the question of fees be again carefully considered. The services in a cemetery may be divided into two classes, those for which direct charge is made, such as providing burial plots and opening of graves; and those that are concerned with general development and in maintenance, as, for instance, reads, lawns, trees, fences, etc. But as these matters concern the lot owners collectively, quite as intimately as the lots do individually, the cost of this work should be borne by them in proper proportion. Certainly nothing outside be borne by them in proper proportion. of interments in and general care of the free burying ground, and possibly, the maintenance of a certain portion, set apart for the burial of those whose relatives are in poor circumstances, should be a charge to the ratepayer. I would, therefore, recommend that in fixing the price of lots, not only the purchase price of the land be taken into consideration, but that an estimate of the cost of bringing this land into shape for burial purposes and all subsequent necessary improvements also be included and costs prorated over actual burial area available. To these costs should also be added a sufficient margin, the interest on which, as it accumulates, will provide for the general care of the cemetery for all time. By this method a fund will be gradually built up as the lots are sold which will provide for the various improvements as they are required and the Cemetery will be entirely self supporting at all times. would further recommend that a Perpetual Care charge be compulaory in the new Cemetery and that it be included in the purchase price of each lot. In the old Cemetery, though now many lots are selling withperpetual care, all the old lots were sold under the old system, with the result that, though many are paid for annually, there are very many that are entirely uncared for, with the result that there is a generally unkempt appearance no matter how great the care lavished on those that are paid for.

NURSERIES.

Considerable transplanting and propagating was done during the spring season. As trees were transplanted, they were graded, and if of sufficient size planted on boulevards and parks or reserved for sale. By further filling in of the slough, a conor reserved for sale. siderable piece of land was reclaimed and made available for planting this season.

Large quantities of cut flowers were supplied for bazaars, flower shows, banquets and exhibitions of various kinds.

985 trees, 2499 shrubs, 1324 perennials and 34 annuals were

the total revenue from these sales being \$1,243.42

There was considerable increase in the quantity of nursery stock sold, the great demand being for trees actually grown by Parks Department. Unfortunately, our stock of trees was insufficient to meet this demand to the full.

The General Hospital took most of these vegetables, about 200 bushels of potatoes being reserved for seed and the small unmarketable vegetables shipped to St. George's Island for winter feed for the deer.

\$1261.22 was spent in cutting weeds on public property and \$543.13 on private property, this latter amount being assessed against the properties. Though it is very essential that the coperation of property owners be secured if this work is to be effective, the least desirable way of securing this co-operation is by loaning the tools of the Department. Quite a mumber of requests were made last year for saythes, etc., but considerable resentment was expressed when a deposit was demanded to insure the return of these in proper condition. It would be cheaper, however for the Department to do the actual cutting free of charge than to loan these tools, and either lose track of them altogether or have them returned in a ruined condition.
