ANNUAL REPORT.

His Worship the Mayor, Commissioner, and Council:-

Gentlemen: -

I beg respectfully to submit my 11th Annual Report dealing with the work of this Department accomplished under your direction during the year 1923.

The abundance of moisture of the past season proved wonderfully helpful to the horticultural branches of the Department's work with the result that not only was it possible to keep lawn areas in a healthier, more vigorous condition, and to have a more brilliant display of flowers for a longer season, than for some years past, but all growth was much more luxuriant, young trees and shrubs making quite remarkable progress and much greater success was attained in propagating work than for some time past. The wonderful horticultural possibilities of the climate, given sufficient precipitation, were never before so graphically demonstrated as during the past season. The rainfall for the summer season was 18.76 inches or 10.05 inches more than for the same period of 1922. The fall was remarkably dry, however, there being no measurable precipitation between September 24th and the beginning of December. What effect this will have on growth it is impossible to determine at the present time.

The following new areas have been added to the Parks System during the past year:— An area of 12.24 acres, valued at \$22,030.00, situated between 2nd and 3rd Streets, and 8th and 12th Avenues N.W., Crescent Heights, to be known as Crescent Park, and a strip of land valued at \$16,500.00 and comprising 3.3 acres along the banks of the Elbow River from 30th Avenue to 34th Avenue. The development work that has taken place on these will be dealt with later in this report.

Summary of planting for the season is as follows: 4942 Trees; 1283 Shrubs; 219 Vines; 17538 Perennial Flowering Plants, and 62379 Annual Flowering Plants.

Censiderable thought has been given for some years past to our office methods as regards routine work, records etc., with two main purposes in view. The first of these was to so systematise the work that it might be kept up to date and yet be handled by the smallest possible staff. The second purpose was to so keep our books that the head of the Department might know from day to day not only the amount of expenditure to date but also the liabilities incurred, so that any piece of work could be stopped at a moment's notice when the appropriation for same was exhausted. Due to the skill and ingenuity of Mr. Vernon the bookkeeper of the Department a system has been perfected which makes this possible, and, during the past year it has been possible at any time to ascertain, in a few moments the expenditure on any piece of work, also the extent of expenditure of the Department's appropriation in relation to a ten-year average. The work of the Department being of so seasonal a nature, this was most helpful.

- CENTRAL PARK.-

The sprinkler system was extended along the north side of the park from the 12th Avenue entrance to the north-east corner. This was to complete certain work begun the previous year and for which material had been purchased. Concrete bases were provided for the War Trophies and the guns were securely fastened to these. Eighteen trees, 1613 perennial flowering plants were planted and 10,008 bedding plants used for the floral display. The base and pedestal for the War Memorial that is being provided by the Col. McLeod Chapter I.O.D.E., was erected in readiness for the statue which is to be placed in position next season and will be a magnificent acquisition to the park. I am happy to state that the architect was in accord with the suggestion made in my last annual report and agreed to a central position on the grass plot in front of the library. The lawn area at the north end of the Bendstand was prepared for planting next spring for the purpose of converting this into a part of the shrubbery border. This will have a better appearance than a poorly kept piece of lawn, will be less expensive to maintain, and will act as a screen to kike any accumulation of refuse there may be.

- MEWATA PARK .-

Considerable repair work was required on the river-side fence. The football and baseball fields were kept in good playing condition and were well patronized throughout the season principally by the intermediate and junior teams. A large quantity of rocks was again removed from the football ground and twenty-seven loads of clay spread.

- RILEY PARK .-

The laborious and expensive method of filling the bathing pool by the use of fire hose was obviated this year by the laying of 500 ft of permanent service pipe from the main. The dressing room was improved by covering with dropsiding, shingling the roof, and painting, and the appearance of this building was much improved thereby.

The Elks Club held their annual picnic for all the children of

The Elks Club held their annual picnic for all the children of Calgary in this park this year. I am very much opposed to this park being used for such picnics. There are no proper facilities and it is entirely unsuited both in design and equipment. Furthermore we have in st. George's Island a park which is properly equipped and ideal for the

One hundred and fourteen trees, 149 shrubs, 2989 perennials, and 16148 annual flowering plants were used. Twenty seven overcrowded spruce trees were transplanted within the name.

trees were transplanted within the park.

Numerous patches of grass that were killed out during the winter of 1922-23 were reseaded, but a good deal more lawn renovation should be done during the coming season.

- ST. GEORGE'S ISLAND. -

About three-fourths of the main driveway was heavily coated with gravel during the winter and steamrolled. The river gravel being the only material available at that season, clay had to be used as a binder. The traffic on this driveway is exceedingly heavy, and, as a result the road wears badly.

The pavilion was completely painted two coats, also the roof of the comfort station. The Refreshment Pavilion was partly re-roofed, a cess pit constructed and improvements made to the interior. This building should be painted, also the comfort station. A new kitchen was built and equipped with stoves for the use of picnic parties. This was placed in a more convenient location adjacent to the picnic ground and where it

is less conspicuous than were the old fireplaces.

Concrete bases were made for the War Trophies.

During the time of the floods men were posted on the bridges night and day to keep debris from accumulating at the bridge piers.

Picnics were fewer in number than usual during the early part of the season due to much rainy weather. There were so many, however, during the latter part of the holiday season, that the equipment and accommodation was taxed to the limit. More picnic tables are urgently needed.

- SHAGANAPPI PARK, GOLF COURSE .-

The past season has been a notable one in the history of the Municipal Golf Course, due to the fact that the City Championship Games were played on this Course. Every effort has been made, not only during the time these games were being played, but throughout the season to keep the Course in the best possible condition, and the many expressions of appreciation from patrons have been very encouraging. The expenditure on the Course was \$4910.43. Total receipts for the season were \$5993.55, made up as follows:-

There was a slight decrease in the number of Gents' season tickets sold, as compared with 1922, due to the opening of another Course, but this was more than counterbalanced by a tremendous increase in the number of day fees.

The Golf House was open 269 days, and golf was played every month from January to December. Greatest number of players in one day, 186 on April 22nd. Daily average, 51: Total number of players registering, 13,668.

The problem of sewage disposal has now been overcome by the con-

struction of an adequate septic tank.
These were planted to form an avenue along the approach to the Clubhouse.

- ELBOW BOULEVARD PARK. -

I beg leave to suggest this as a suitable designation for the area of approximately three acres that was dedicated as a park site this year and which it was possible to improve to the extent of an expenditure of \$2,000.00 through the magnanimity of a near-by resident. The improvements made included grading, laying of a water service, seeding of lawns, formation of paths and tree planting.

- SUNDRY PLOTS -

Under this heading are included the City Hall Garden, Tompkins Gardens, Garden Crescent, The R.N.W.M.Police Memorial and the Island Plots at a number of street intersections. Besides the regular maintenance of these areas, trees were planted on the new Crescent Park and on a small park site in Sunalta which had not been previously Assistance was also rendered in the improvement of the Convalescent Home Grounds.

- PIAYGROUNDS. -

Nineteen Playgrounds were maintained throughout the year and nine supervised during the holiday season.

The daily average for each ground was: - Boys 73; Girls 79; Combines, 152.

The average attendance for the nine Playgrounds for the season was, Boys 2115; Girls 2301; Boys & Girls combined 4416.

There were twelve wet days during the time the Playgrounds were open, the actual number of days of supervision being 29.

The games participated in were baseball, basketball, quoits, vollyball, tether tennis, and other athletic and active games, swimming, industrial work and story telling. Schedules of home and away games in both basket ball and baseball were played during the season, which resulted in thirty games in each branch of sport. Friendly games of dodgeball and vollyball were arranged by the supervisors of each ground.

Arrangements were made with the Y.W.C.A., for swimming instruction

for girls, 1080 girls receiving instruction.

The system of daily reports made cut by the supervisors had much to do with increasing their services, because it fixed the responsibility of the employee and made him or her accountable for conducting definite activities during all hours of the period.

- ATHLETICS. -

Together with the maintenance of the football and baseball fields in Mewata Park, the cricket grounds in Riley Park and the general maintenance of Hillhurst Athletic Park, certain expenditures were made on football, baseball and tennis grounds in Crescent Heights, Tuxedo Park and South Calgary football grounds, the swimming pool on the Elbow River, the painting of the dressing room at this latter location and the City Hall Tennis Courts.

Permission for the use of certain lands in Elbow Park belonging to the City was granted to the Calgary Cricket League, and a cricket ground established there.

Summer Sports.

Baschall, - Two-hundred and twelve permits were issued for senior This by no means includes all the games at Mewata Park. games played however.

Football, Soccer. The Senior League elected to play at Victoria Park this season, but some sixty-one matches were played at Hillhurst by the Intermediate, Junior, and School Teams.

> Rugby. The ten School games played at Mewata proved immensely popular, attracting enormous crowds of spectators.

Cricket .- The following is a report on the Cricket activities in Riley Park, during this season, by L. Phillips, of the Calgary & District Cricket League.

> "The cricket schedule for the season of 1923 in the Saturday League called for 42 games to be played in Riley Park, and despite the unfavorable climatic conditions prevailing during the latter part of May and the early part of June which caused posponements, the full schedule was played out, though the posponed games were played very late in the year. The first games were played on May 12, and the last on September 21st.

"There are three excellent pitches in the Park, and this permits 6 teams to play each afternoon, The Park throughout the season was kept in splendid shape, and its beautiful flowers attracted many visitors who stayed to

watch the cricket games.

"In addition to the 42 league games, Cup games and the Champions versus Test of League games were played on the Park, and all visiting teams were entertained at the Park, which is now known as Alberta's Cricket Ground throughout the Western Provinces, and as I has at the Coast this season with Alberta's team, I must include in my report that, good as the British Columbia playing grounds undoubtedly are, they, have not the level, finished and well kept appearance that our one real cricket ground has.

"The ladies Cricket Club recently formed, played a good number of evening and aftermoon games during the season, and for the first time in Calgary's cricket history games

between teams of young boys were played.

"The Wednesday Cricket League also took advantage of the Park to play a number of their League games, and though a Tournament week could not unfortunately be arranged, I can safely conclude my report by saying that with the possible exception of the year 1922, when the Western Canada Cricket Tournament was held in the city, Riley Park was used to a greater extent by cricketers than ever before, in fact, it is regarded as "Cricket Head-quarters". "

ATHLETICS. (Contd.)

Tennis .- An East Calgary Club was given the use of the tennis courts at St. George's Island on condition that the Club bore all the cost of maintenance.

Winter Sports.

During the winter of 1922-23, the most popular rink was again that at Hillhurst Athletic Park, where two hockey Rinks.rinks and a large sheet of ice for general skating was maintained. A bandstand was built and a band engaged, and this added considerably to the popularity of the rink. special charge was made when the band was in attendance to

Meet the additional cost.

A large rink was also maintained at Mewata Park and throughout the City. thirty-six smaller rinks scattered throughout the City. The Department flooded rinks for the Separate School Authorities and twenty-five private rinks and was paid for this work. The six hockey rinks constructed and maintained by the Department were in great demand and seemed inadequate to meet the requirements of the various hockey aggregations.

This season, owing to curtailment of appropriation small rinks are being flooded at Mewata and Hillhurst Parks only.

-- BOULEVARDS. --

Guards were removed from some of the older and well established trees and placed on those newly planted ones that seemed to most need protection. All trees should, of course, have guards, as many that are now destroyed would be saved by this protection, but it has not been possible to purchase any guards for some years, so the next best method of protecting them is resorted to, namely, to remove guards from the older and place on the younger trees.

All boulevards were raked and cleaned during April, the Public Works Department co-operating with this Department in this work to the

extent of hauling away the refuse.

Commencing on April 25th, 1801 new trees and 70 shrubs were planted, and the regular work of staking, cultivating, watering, and spraying was carried on to the extent that appropriation for these

purposes permitted.

Grass cutting was commenced on May 29th. The abnormal growth of grass due to a wet season and inadequate allowance made it quite impossible to keep pace with this work, so that the boulevards presented a very disreputable appearance during most of the summer. Mowing machines were abandoned at the end of June, and scythes only used, and by the end of July this work had to be entirely abandoned because of lack of funds.

Tree pruning was commenced November 23rd, and, owing to very favourable weather good progress was made with this work by the end of the year. It is most regrettable that many trees have to be pruned in such a way that they are terribly mutilated and disfigured because of overhead wires, and this at a period when they are just approaching their best in the matter of appearance and shade- and shelter-giving qualities.

Four hundred trees were planted on the Memorial Drive, all tagss checked with plans and replaced where missing.

Considerable repairs were made to Riverside Boulevard fonce.

There was a further considerable increase in the Perpetual Care Fund, the total amount now being \$8,900.42) This system of providing for the care of graves becomes more and more popular as it becomes better known and understood by lot owners.

Old Cemetery, (Union). Considerably more grading was done on the new section X, water service laid, and a rough fence built to enclose this area. The work of guttering and retaining wall construction on the roads was extended. 1180 trees, 335 shrubs,

construction on the roads was extended. 1180 trees, 300 shrubs, 2935 perennial flowering plants and 19,687 bedding plants were planted.

The steep approach to the Chapel, which had been regularly washed out into a deep gully by the melting of snow and heavy rain storms was heavily coated with gravel, the road well crowned and cobblestone retaining walls and guttering constructed, so that the very unsatisfactory condition that previously existed has been permanently remedied.

The gravel for this work was obtained from the pit immediately east of The gravel for this work was obtained from the pit immediately east of the New Cemetery. This pit is proving very useful and we are now able to use gravel for road work in the Cometeries in place of cinders, which were less satisfactory and in any case, difficult to obtain. The pit being situated so close to the Cemeteries makes the cost of hauling very light.

Drifting snow causes considerable trouble at times. This winter snow traps have been erected in those locations that have given the most trouble and seem to be working satisfactorily.

The steep bank on 2nd Street East adjoining the Hebrew Cemetery was seeded for the second time. Some brome grass roots were also transplanted; these survived, and will no doubt establish themselves and spread over the whole area thus preventing further erosion.

New Cemetery, Burnsland. The whole area was cleared, ploughed, disced, herrowed and seeded to timothy and oats. Six hundred and thirty-five trees, and 381 shrubs were planted. Loam was removed from 4890 square yands of road surface and 4190 square yards of gravel laid three inches deep.

Four hundred and sixty-feet of 2", and 360 ft of 3" pipe have been laid and the main tapped in three places for additional extensions. It is found that irrigation by gravity can be adopted to some extent on this area particularly in connection with the watering of trees and shrubs.

Owing to the sandy nature of the soil, much trouble was experienced for a time by the caving in of graves during the process of digging. This has been overcome by the use of cribbing.

Now that the Cross of Sacrifice has been erected on the Veterans' Plot and the temporary wooden crosses marking individual graves are being replaced with the granite slabs supplied by the Imperial War Graves Commission this spot has become the most touching and interesting feature of the Old Cemetery. It consists of a two-hundred grave plot in the most prominent part of the Cemetery. The City bears the entire cost of seeding and maintaining this area which is now completely filled. With a view to adopting the same idea in the Burnsland Cemetery the organization known as the Last Post Fund has secured the reservation of a complete section for the burial of ex-service men and women only, and when the development of this area materializes in accordance with the plans decided upon, it is anticipated that this also will develope into a very beautiful plot fittingly honouring the burial place of those who served the Empire during the Great War.

One of the problems that will in the near future have to be considered is that of the proper care of the Old Cemetery, now that it is practically filled and revenue no longer received from it. While the axpedient of requiring the purchaser of a lot to undertake to pay an annual sum for its upkeep has been followed, this is an old fashioned method, and, as the owners die or disappear the lots become abandoned to neglect and decay, presenting that most melancholy sight that is unfortunately by no means rare in so many cemeteries where this system is This problem has led to the adoption of some form of perpetual care and its adoption is now of almost universal application. In fact, in the United States, the State Legislatures make it compulsory that 25% of the revenue received from the sale of lots be set aside as a

Perpetual Care Fund.

Whilst it is impossible to accurately forecase future costs, or to say definitely just what amount will be required at some future period to maintain the cemetery grounds in proper order, an effort should be made to keep abreast of modern practice and to insure that such a Fund will be reserved as will be sufficient for the purpose, so far as can be fore-seen at the present time, without unduly adding exorbitant cost to the lots. I had hoped that a system of this kind would be adopted before the sale of lots commenced in the New Cemetery.

Now that the Old Cemetery Site is completely filled, the following facts and statistics with regard to it may be of interest:

The Site was purchased in 1890 for the amount of \$4230.00. The total area is 56.5 acres, of which 47.3 acres have been used for Cemetery purposes, 31.3 acres being actually sold for burial plots. The total number of burials to December 31st 1923 was (10,888)

The Civic Nurseries contain at the present time 18,308 trees, 67,368 shrubs, and 13,853 miscellaneous plants of a total value of \$18,808.25. These consist of 14 different species of trees, 61 of shrubs, and 318 species and varieties of plants.

The following propagating by cuttings was done; 7050 trees; 5500 shrubs.

The following record of purchases of trees, shrubs and plants is an indication of the advantage of operating a civic nursery and the saving effected thereby.

- GREENHOUSES. -

The arrangement under which the Civic Greenhouses was leased Euring the past season has proved very satisfactory, and might well be continued until the City's financial condition warrants their operation by the Department. It is to be hoped that that time is not far distant, as it is a great advantage to the Parks Department to have the use of these greenhouses.

- GRASSHOPPERS. -

Whilst the Department was well organized to fight this plague if necessary, no action was required on our part.

GENLRAL.

The Department incurred an expenditure of \$268.89 during the floods in moving the accumulated debris to save park bridges and in watching night and day to prevent further accumulations, also to secure some large trees that were undermined and threatened with destruction. While the regular staff did this work, it was almost entirely a matter of overtime, particularly with regard to watching bridges, and special equipment had to be purchased. This work had to be paid for out of items of the oppropriation, for which little enough provision had been made,; consequently certain sections of the work suffered to that extent. This additional expense notwithstanding, the Department managed to finish the year with an unexpended balance of its appropriation of \$172.75

Some slight alterations were made to the offices for the purpose of facilitating business with the public and have proved very advantageous.

Certain changes were made to the heating system in the Superintendent's house, with slight improvement.

The flag poles in all parks require to be painted.

It is unfortunate that the work of this Department is of such a seasonal nature that a very large percentage of the staff consists of temporary employees. Short time employees are usually unskilled in the work they have to do and have no interest in it beyond getting in the time and receiving their pay envelope. It is only possible to get full value from such workers by having them work continuously supervised by a foreman, which is obviously impracticable. The result is that the propensity of such employees to idle and gossip is frequently noticed and criticized by the public, which criticism is reflected on the regular employees, many of whom are skilled and conscientious workers.
