


Labour Market (Unadjusted)

- The unemployment rate in the Calgary Economic Region (CER) rose to 5.0 per cent in March, down from 5.1 per cent during the same time last year. Nationally, the unemployment rate was 7.4 per cent, a 0.1 percentage point decrease from March 2013.
- Total employment in the CER climbed 3.7 per cent year-over-year, landing at 838,900 in March.
- The working age population of the Calgary Economic Region was estimated at 1,207,200, marking another 4.0 per cent increase from the same time last year.

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


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Labour Market (continued)

 Between February 2013 and February 2014, the number of Calgarians receiving regular benefits advanced 0.8 per cent to 9,610. For Alberta overall the measure increased 1.1 per cent to 29,450.






Energy

- Continued tensions surrounding the Crimean crisis held the average crude oil price above US\$100/bbl in March. Overall West Texas Intermediate (WTI) oil averaged US\$100.48/bbl, an 8.1 per cent jump from the year before. The price for Western Canada Select (WCS), which is the price obtained by many Albertan producers, rose to US\$79.42/bbl.
- Meanwhile, the average price for natural gas at AECO fell to \$4.96/GJ as somewhat warmer weather helped offset concerns over low storage levels. This represented a 30.8 per cent drop from February, but prices were up 52.1 per cent from the same time last year.

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
Prices


- Calgary's 12-month-moving-average inflation rate accelerated to 2.4 per cent in March. The 0.3 percentage point jump in inflation from the previous month was almost entirely due to a hefty increase in heating costs. Nationally, the same measure of inflation ticked up to 1.1 per cent.
- During the month of March average hourly wages in Alberta rose just 0.6 per cent year-overyear. This was a considerable slowdown from both the month and year before. Conversely, average weekly earnings were up 1.2 per cent in February.




General Indicators

- Canada's real gross domestic product (GDP) growth:
 - Grew by 0.2 per cent month-over-month in February following a hefty 0.5 per cent rebound the month before.
 - On a year-over-year basis the rate of economic expansion decelerated marginally from 2.6 per cent in January to 2.5 per cent in February.
- The Canadian prime business loan rate was flat at 3.0 per cent yet again in March 2014.


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Consumer Indicators

- In February, total retail sales in the CER were estimated at \$2.5 billion on a seasonally adjusted basis. This was an increase of 1.6 per cent monthover-month and a 4.7 per cent jump from February 2013. For Alberta overall, sales jumped 8.3 per cent year-over-year to a fresh all-time high of \$6.5 billion.
- The Index of Canadian Consumer Confidence (where 2002=100) climbed nearly 3 points to 88.5 in March.
- Total housing starts in Calgary (CMA) soared to 1,667 units in March, nearly doubling the amount from March 2013. This also represented a 31.3 per cent leap from February as warmer weather likely helped boost construction activity.
- Resale activity in Calgary also picked up in March. The number of dwellings sold jumped to 3,170, up from 2,363 in February and 2,631 in March 2013.
- The average MLS sale price for Calgary homes also continued to advance. At just below \$463,000 prices were up 0.6% per cent from the month before and 4.9 per cent from the same time last year.







Business Indicators

- Albertan wholesale trade activity rose during the month of February. Sales climbed to \$6.9 billion (seasonally adjusted), up 1.1 per cent from the previous month and 3.6 per cent from February of last year.
- Manufacturing sales in the province were also on the rise in February. Shipments were estimated at \$6.5 billion, which constitutes a hefty 5.9 per cent jump year-over-year. However, sales were essentially flat from January 2014.
- In March the total value of building permits issued by the city of Calgary reached \$388 million as the number of dwellings planned fell from 857 in February to 714.
