
Highlights:

- Calgary inflation was 1.32 per cent in October 2017, slightely up from 1.24 per cent last month and 1.19 in October 2016. Rapidly rising gasoline prices were a significant contributor to inflation this month in Calgary. Utilities rose 3.06 per cent in October 2017 up from 1.42 per cent in the previous month. Health and personal care were up 2.95 per cent for October 2017, up from 1.81 in September 2017 and 1.46 in October 2016. House prices in Calgary are steadily rising this year by about 1.90 per cent, increasing at a slightly faster pace than last year.
- Alberta inflation was 1.33 per cent in October 2017, up from 0.52 per cent last October 2016. Canada saw inflation of 1.39 per cent, up slightly from 1.49 last October 2016. With such low inflation nationally, it is unlikely that the Bank of Canada will raise interest rates on December 6th. Currently the Bank of Canada target rate is 1.0 per cent and the prime interest rate is 3.2 per cent. Next year, mortgage rules will change. New mortgages will have to pass a "stress" test where new borrowers will have to qualify at an interest rate that is 2 per cent above the lenders posted mortgage rate. It is expected that this will further soften hot real estate markets in Toronto and Vancouver.
