CER unemployment rate was 4.5 per cent in January 2014


The seasonally unadjusted data from Statistics Canada's January 2014 Labour Force Survey for the Calgary Economic Region (CER) showed the following:

- The unemployment rate in the Calgary Economic Region (CER) was calculated at 4.5 per cent in January 2014, up from 4.4 per cent in the previous month but down from 4.6 per cent in January 2013. The youth (ages 15 -19) was estimated at 16.1 per cent in January 2014, up from 13 per cent in January 2013.
- Total employment in the CER was estimated at 845,400 in January 2014, unchanged from the previous month but up 31,600 from a year ago. Full-time employment accounted for most of the job gains (23,000) in the previous 12 months.
- The CER's labour force was estimated at 885,400 in January 2014, up by 32,200 from the same time last year. The labour force grew at roughly the same pace as total employment. This resulted in the number of unemployed (40,000) remaining virtually unchanged from the same period 2013.
- Calgary's average weekly wage rate was estimated at \$1,078 in January 2014, down by 2.7 per cent from the same period 2013.

• Total employment in the Calgary-Edmonton corridor was estimated at 1,718,100 as at January 2014, up by 65,800 from the same period 2013. Calgary accounted for 31,600 and Edmonton 28,900 of the jobs created. The Calgary-Edmonton corridor accounted for 88.8 per cent of the total job creation in Alberta in the last 12 months. In this period the, this region accounted for 44.7 per cent of the jobs created in Canada.


Chart 1. CER full-time and part-time employment (March 1987 - January 2014, thousands of persons)


