# Strategic Goals: Updates and Accomplishments

### STRATEGIC GOAL #1: STRENGTHEN COMMUNITY POLICING

- Construction of the Calgary Child Advocacy Centre has begun at the Child Development Centre, University of Calgary campus. (AP 1.3-06)
- CPS funding has been allocated and a Request for Proposal drafted to purchase a mobile ballistic examination lab expected delivery is the end of 2012. (AP 1.1-08)
- As a result of the Joint Graffiti Investigative Team, a total of 58 *Criminal Code* charges have been laid and 38 arrest warrants executed in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter. (AP 1.1-07)
- The CPS Drug Unit, School Resources Team, and Alberta Health Services Youth Addiction Services collaborated to create a Start Smart Stay Safe drug education module for junior and senior high schools. (AP 1.3-03)
- The CPS announced the expansion of the Multi-Agency School Support Team (MASST) with four new teams to start between September 2012 and January 2013. (AP 1.3-03)
- Due to an increase in car prowlings, District 2 members and CPS Cadets distributed crime prevention materials throughout the community. (AP 1.3-03)
- The Diversity Resources Team hosted the Columbian Consular Office at the Westwinds Campus which provided consular services to over 300 people. (AP 1.4-02)
- The CPS officially launched the Elder Abuse Response Team with the goal of reducing victimization of older adults by providing a multidisciplinary continuum of services and support to elder abuse victims. (AP 1.3-04)
- The CPS Executive Committee approved the creation of an Analytical Section to provide a centralized and coordinated approach to crime analysis. (AP 1.5-02)
- The Real Time Operations Centre (RTOC) implemented a new Operational Command structure to increase the level of command, oversight and mentorship to field personnel, while improving efficiencies and providing effective policing to the citizens of Calgary. (AP 1.1-05)
- Public Safety Communications employees have been trained on the Priority Dispatch System (a new call evaluation process for police 911) and implementation of the new process is underway. (AP 1.1-02)

### STRATEGIC GOAL #2: FOSTER A STRONG WORKPLACE COMMUNITY

- The CPS Civilian Development Initiative has been approved by the Executive Committee and will begin in September 2012. (AP 2.4-05)
- The 2011-2014 CPS Recruiting Strategic Plan has been completed and implementation is underway. (AP 2.2-02)
- The Chief Crowfoot Learning Centre has completed a full redesign of the Recruit Training Program it now includes experential learning weeks, enhanced problem based learning scenarios and (through a partnership with Mount Royal University) the introduction of police justice studies.
- CPS In-Service Course "Leadership in the CPS" has been developed and delivery of the 2-day course begins in September. Development of "Professionalism in Policing (Ethics)" and "Leading Performance" are underway and both courses will roll out in Spring 2013. (AP 2.4-02)
- Seventy-two candidates are being selected for the CPS Leadership Development Program (LDP 200) in September. (AP 2.4-01)

## STRATEGIC GOAL #3: OPTIMIZE EFFICIENCIES WHILE FOCUSING ON INFORMATION, TECHNOLOGY AND INFRASTRUCTURE

- The CPS and Ottawa RCMP have successfully concluded pilot testing of electronic criminal fingerprint submissions and charge information. Full CPS migration is expected by the end of 2012. (AP 3.4-11)
- API3 (Alberta Police Integrated Information Initiative) business engagement workshops have begun and are scheduled to conclude in August. (AP 3.2-03)
- Implementation of the District/General Investigations Unit (GIU) Realignment has begun and the Program Charter received approval. (AP 3.1-02)
- The classification of the CPS Records Retention Schedule table is now complete and ready for Service-wide application. (AP 3.4-09)

# Key Challenges

- Residential break and enters remain a top priority for the CPS and, in response to recent increases, a citywide residential break and enter initiative is being developed.
- To promote public safety, the CPS Traffic Section has implemented several traffic safety initiatives, including speed enforcement within construction zones, resulting in an increase in summonses.
- The Auto Theft Unit requires a comprehensive response by both investigations and prosecutions due to an increase in cloned vehicle identification number (VIN) offences.
- The RCMP announced that although three of six forensic labs will be closing over the next few years, service delivery will not be impacted. The CPS is proactively working towards a fully functioning ballistic lab and RCMP labs will not be relied upon for firearms examinations. The CPS Forensic Crime Scenes Unit recently implemented a team deployment shifting model to improve the CPS response to crime scenes.
- As programs guided by the CPS Crime Prevention & Reduction Continuum grow to accommodate the needs of our community, CPS resources are challenged to house and support these programs and their growth.
- The Recruit Training Program revamp, the introduction of Bill C-24, the Federal Omnibus Crime Bill and staffing shortages have considerably increased the workload of the Chief Crowfoot Learning Centre.
- The e-Disclosure Implementation Team has been challenged due to employee turnover within the Team, and assignment of new staff at the CPS Court and Disclosure Unit.

# Financial Summary

- As of the end of the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter, fine revenue was \$3.2 million favorable. Overtime was over expended by approximately \$455 thousand. \$108 thousand related to additional civilian overtime required to cover staff turnover and short term absences due to illness and additional workload in some areas. \$189 thousand related to recoverable operations. The remainder was mainly due to various operational initiatives surrounding criminal investigations. Savings in other areas offset these deficits.
- Capital projects are ongoing. \$11.0 million has been spent or committed to the end of June. The majority of expenditures were for the equipment and IT infrastructure and patrol vehicles.
- The Calgary Police Service Pay-As-You-Go Reserve had a balance of \$2.5 million at January 1<sup>st</sup> 2012. No expenditures or contributions have been made in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter.
