
A mobility safety activity book












Can you spot the 8 differences between the rider with all their safety accessories and the one without? Did you know? It's the law for children under 18 to wear a helmet when riding a bike.




People walking, wheeling and driving all share the road so it is important to follow the rules and watch out for each other.






Transit Safety. Stop, look & listen!



Be safe, and watch out! When a vehicle is backing up, their rear white



The speed limit on pathways is 20 km/h.






Connect the dots and colour.

For drivers, this colour light means Go, if it is safe.

This colour light means Stop.

Don't cross and wait until the next pedestrian walk symbol.


This colour means caution, and warns that the light is about to change red.


The "walk" symbol indicates it is safe to begin crossing the street, but always watch out for vehicles.

This sign means you must come to a complete **Stop**, and do not proceed until safe.

Playground zone reduce speed during posted hours.

This road is a bicycle route.









Crosswalk safety

Signalling your intent to cross can help keep you safe! Remember to **POINT** in the direction you wish to go. **PAUSE** to make sure all traffic has stopped. **PROCEED** across the street, once safe.

Draw a line between the description of each type of crosswalk on the left and it's photo on the right.

Unmarked crosswalks:

exist at every intersection where there is a sidewalk, unless signs indicate that the crosswalk is closed. They extend from the corner of one sidewalk, across the roadway, to the opposite sidewalk.



Marked crosswalks:

have signs and painted white lines that extend from the corner of one sidewalk, to the corner of the opposite sidewalk.

Marked crosswalks may also be located mid-block (between intersections).



Ladder crosswalks:

have both horizontal and vertical lines. They are found at intersections close to schools and other areas with high pedestrian activity.



Multi-use crosswalks:

are used to connect pathways and cycling infrastructure across roads. They have vertical lines with square markings on the outside called "elephant feet". People cycling may ride through these crosswalks without dismounting.


















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
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
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When thinking about safe travel around schools, ask yourself:


- Are people crossing at the corner or crosswalk?
- Are people paying attention to where they are going?
- Are drivers yielding to pedestrians? Are pedestrians waiting for driver?
- Is anyone parked where they shouldn't be?



Top Safety Tips!

Wheeling Safe:

- Always wear a helmet.
- Be predictable: know and use your cycling hand signals.
- Use lights and reflectors for low light or dark conditions.

Let others know you're coming: use your bell or voice when passing.

Before going out on a ride, do an **ABC** check:

Air: is the right amount in your tires?

Brakes: are they working properly?

Chain: is it clean, and moving smoothly?



Walking Safe:

- Be visible. Bright coloured clothing and using lights or reflectors help make you more visible in the dark.
- Cross at corners and crosswalks, not in the middle of a block or from between parked cars.
- When crossing the street remember to:
- Stop a few steps back from the curb.
- Look all ways (even behind you).
- **(1)** Listen for traffic.

Signalling your intent to cross can help keep you safe!

Remember to:

Point in the direction you wish to go.

Pause to make sure all traffic has stopped.

Proceed across the street, once safe.

Make sure to look all ways
